NCCARE360 Overview



NCCARE360 helps providers electronically connect those with identified needs to community resources and allow for feedback and follow-up.






NCCARE360 is live in 100 counties

North Carolina - At a Glance

NCCARE360 is statewide and available to all 10.6M North Carolina residents

Over **94,000** clients served by over **182,000** referrals to over **2800** organizations and locations in our network including CBOs, clinics, faith-based, schools, all LME-MCOs and PHPs statewide, Cone Health, Duke, UNC, Wake Forest Baptist Health, Mission Health Partners, and smaller rural clinics

Food Assistance is the **most needed** service type.

What services do our children need in NC?

For our pediatric population (under 17) the case service type breakdown is:

- 28% Food Assistance
- 16% Individual and Family Support
- 15% Income Support
- 13% Housing and Shelter
- 8% Clothing and Household Goods

Building a Healthier North Carolina


Part of a Broader Statewide Framework

The Problem:

Connecting people to community resources is inconsistent, not coordinated, not secure, and not trackable.

The Solution:

Uniform system for providers, insurers, and community organizations to coordinate care, collaborate, and track progress and outcomes. Tool to make it easier to connect people with the community resources they need to be healthy.





Recommendations from United Way NC

Building Connections for a Healthier North Carolina

- Define upfront how a care coordination initiative fits into the mission and what role you would like to play
- 2. Be clear about the strategy and how you will interact with technology
- Be ready to market your role, as the vendors are masterful at marketing their own
- 4. Create a governance framework and structure
- Don't underestimate the role that UWs and 211s can play in implementation and strategy
- 6. Keep updating Advisory Committee, strategy, success metrics



Supporting our communities together in real time

Adopting best practices and refining them

- Create a collective vision around the mission
- Establish and maintain trust in organizational approaches and engagement methodologies, ie individual organizational missions and vision
- Messaging, internal and external, is very important
- Lead with the engagement of communities, not with the technology
- Do not underestimate the financial burden and in-kind costs
- Decide who needs to be at the table and who brings those people to the table
- Decide on a governance structure
- Discuss and agree on marketing and branding strategies
- Roll it out like a community's vision rather than a statewide goal
- Create and sustain a steering committee with administrators and vendors
- Create SOPs, public-facing documents, client v provider- facing documents for coordination centers
